JOINT ELECTION OBSERVATION MISSION CONGRATULATES GHANA FOR A SUCCESSFUL 2024 GENERAL ELECTIONS

The civil society election observation missions from East and West Africa congratulate the people of Ghana on the generally successful conduct of the presidential and legislative elections that took place on December 7, 2024.

At a time in the region when elections and political transitions have been a major source of instability and tension, Ghana's election provides a significant landmark for democracy on the continent.

The regional delegation, which comprises the West Africa Democracy Solidarity Network (WADEMOS), the West Africa Election Observers Network (WAEON), East and HORN of Africa (E-HORN) Observers Network, Centre for Democracy and Development (CDD-West Africa), and Yiaga Africa (Nigeria), commend all stakeholders particularly the Electoral Commission, political parties, the media and other democratic institutions including civil society and the Coalition of Domestic Election Observers (CODEO), in particular, for their professional conduct and contribution to the successful conduct of the entire electoral process despite the few reported incidents especially during the results collation.

The mission acknowledges and commends the statesmanship demonstrated by the presidential candidate of the governing New Patriotic Party (NPP), Dr. Alhaji Mahamudu Bawumia for gracefully conceding to former president John Mahama, the presidential candidate of the National Democratic Congress (NDC) on the basis of results collated by the party even before the announcements of results by the Electoral Commission.

As pro-democracy networks, committed to the regional and continental aspirations of democracy and good governance, Ghana's exemplary democratic leadership, in addition to recent electoral gains from Senegal and Liberia provide a renewed hope for addressing democratic recession in Africa, particularly West Africa.

As the mission awaits the official declaration of results by the Electoral Commission, all stakeholders are urged to remain peaceful and allow for a smooth transition process. The mission remains committed to the sustenance of democracy, prosperity and stability across Africa and continues to express solidarity with the people of Ghana.
